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Overview

2003: Governor Pataki signed legislation the calls for a NYS Invasive Species Task Force

2005: NYS Invasive
Species Task Forces
releases final report
with recommendations
to Governor and
Legislature

2008: ECL establishes the Invasive Species Council, Advisory Committee, and NYSDEC's Invasive Species Coordination Section

2008: *i*MapInvasives, nyis.info and NYISRI established

2010-2013: NYSDEC contracted for administration all 8 PRISMs across the state

NYS Invasive Species Task Force

- In 2005, the NYS Invasive Species Task Force Report recommended:
 - 1. Establish a permanent leadership structure to coordinate invasive species efforts
 - 2. Prepare and implement a comprehensive invasive species management plan
 - 3. Allocate appropriate resources for invasive species efforts





NYS Invasive Species Task Force

- In 2005, the NYS Invasive Species Task Force Report recommended:
 - 4. Establish a comprehensive education and outreach effort
 - 5. Integrate databases and information clearinghouses
 - 6. Convene a regular invasive species conference
 - 7. Formalize New York State policy and practices on invasive species
 - 8. Establish a center for invasive species research



NYS Invasive Species Task Force

- In 2005, the NYS Invasive Species Task Force Report recommended:
 - 9. Coordinate and streamline regulatory processes
 - 10. Encourage nonregulatory approaches to prevention
 - 11. Influence Federal actions to support invasive species prevention, eradication and control
 - 12. Recognize and fund demonstration projects





The beginnings of the invasive species program

- In 2008, ECL Article 17 established the:
 - Invasive Species Council (9 agency reps)
 - Invasive Species Advisory Committee (25 groups)
 - Invasive Species Coordination Section at DEC






Figure 2. Collaborative Network for Invasive Species Management in New York State



Invasive Species Council

- Created to coordinate state entities and partners to address the environmental and economic threats of invasive species
- Co-led by NYSDEC and NYS Dept. of Ag. & Markets
 - 9 members: NYSDEC, NYSDAM, Dept. of Transportation, NYS Education Dept., Dept. of State, Office of Parks, Recreation & Historic Preservation, Thruway Authority, Canal Corporation and the Adirondack Park Agency





Role of the Council

- Meet at least quarterly
- Regularly consult with the Advisory Committee
- Develop a comprehensive plan for invasive species management
- Provide input on funding priorities
- Provide input on grant applications

Role of the Council

- Organize and convene a biennial invasive species summit
- Encourage industries and trade organizations to develop and adopt voluntary codes of conduct
- Support and encourage Partnerships for Regional Invasive Species Management (PRISMs)
- Report to the legislature and the governor to recommend lists of prohibited, regulated, unregulated species plus a procedure for the review of a unlisted non-native species

Role of the Council

- Reimburse necessary and actual expenses of NYS Invasive Species Advisory Committee members
- Establish, operate and maintain state-wide locational database (GIS)
- Establish, operate and maintain state-wide information clearinghouse
- Review and revise relevant state agency and public authority actions and policies
- Review and reform of relevant regulatory processes





Invasive Species Advisory Committee



Invasive Species Advisory Committee

- Created to provide information, advice and guidance to the Invasive Species Council
- Up to 25 members from stakeholder organizations
- Membership: Farm Bureau, NYC Dept. of Environmental Protection, New York Sea Grant, Natural Heritage Program, SUNY ESF, NYS Turf Grass Association, etc.





Efforts of the Advisory Committee

- Assist the Council in developing a four tier classification system for nonnative animal and plant species
- Preparing a white paper advising the Invasive Species Council on preventing the spread of aquatic invasive species by boats and trailers
- Assist the Council in drafting a proposed legislative bill aimed at reducing the spread of aquatic invasive species by boats and trailers





NYSDEC's Invasive Species Coordination Section



- Goal: Facilitating a coordinated, comprehensive and strategic framework to address all taxa of invasive species in New York State
- Section within NYSDEC's Bureau of Invasive Species & Ecosystem Health





Coordination:

- \$13.3 Million SFY 2019/20
 Environmental Protection Fund (EPF)
- Oversee, direct and administer the 8 PRISMs, NYISRI, iMapInvasives
- 2019 grant program \$2.8 million in AIS spread prevention, rapid response & control grants, research projects, lake management planning

Terrestrial Invasive Species:

- Management activities

- Early detection & rapid response
- Habitat restoration & monitoring
- Stakeholder education
- Volunteer recruitment/training
- Act as regional communication hubs






New York State PRISMs

Eight (8) established partnerships statewide; eco-political regions Formally established via individual competitive Service Contracts Scope of Work elements borrowed from the CWMA Cookbook Funded by the Environmental Protection Fund (EPF) Required to develop 5-Year Strategic Plans, Annual Workplans and Quarterly/ Annual Reports; Quarterly invoices processed for reimbursement of related expenses

- Mission: coordinate invasive species research to help prevent and manage the impact of invasive species in New York State
- Promote information sharing and collaboration
- Facilitate interaction and cooperation between scientists, natural resource managers and state offices

 - Data analysis and summaries in the web interface and GIS






